Former Chair of AAMES, Dr. Ravindra N. Sharma Named ACRL Academic/ Research Librarian of the Year 2005

Each year, the Association of College & Research Libraries recognizes an Academic/Research Librarian for his/her outstanding national or international contribution to academic or research librarianship and library development. The award, sponsored by YBP Library Services, carries \$3,000 cash and a plaque.

It is a great honor for the minority Librarians in North America that for the first time in the history of ACRL, the award for the year 2005 has been given to Dr. Ravindra Nath Sharma for his significant contributions to the

profession of academic librarianship. Dr Sharma is the only librarian of color to achieve this distinction so far, and joins with many previous award winners including Tom Kirk (2004); Ross Atkinson, (2003); Shelley Phipps, (2002), Larry Hardesty (2001), Sharon Hogan (2000), and Hannelore Rader (1999).

Dr. R.N. Sharma is the Director of Library at the West Virginia State University in Institute, West Virginia, and will receive the award on Monday, June 27, 2005, at 4:30 p.m., at a ceremony and reception during the American Library Association (ALA) Annual Conference in Chicago. Before joining the West Virginia State University in 1996, Dr. Sharma was Director of the University of Evansville Library, Head Librarian of the Penn State University-Beaver campus, Assistant Director of Public Services & Collections at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, and Reference Librarian at Colgate University. Dr Sharma is a professional of high repute and is an active librarian who has won many others awards, grants and honors. Earlier, in 1997, Dr. Sharma received the Humphry/OCLC/Forest Press Award for his "significant

achievements and contributions to International Librarianship" given the ALA.

Dr. Sharma has published more than 250 research papers, editorials, interviews, conference reports, and reviews in various professional journals of Asia, Europe, and North America. He has authored and edited more than ten books, and his latest book 'Impact of Technology on Library Collections and Services' is being published by the Scarecrow Press. Since 1984 Dr. Sharma has been the Editor of Library Times International, and has also served on the editorial committees of books and reputed journals. Professionally Dr Sharma is actively involved in various national and international conferences, workshops and seminars. Because of his enormous contributions and professional involvements, Dr. Sharma is listed in more than twenty biographical resources including Directory of American Scholars, Dictionary of International Biography, Who's Who in the World, Contemporary Authors, and Outstanding People of the 20th Century.

Edward A. Warro, the Award Committee Chair said that the committee unanimously chose Dr. Sharma because of his unequaled contributions to the field of international librarianship. Dr Sharma has sustained a distinguished record of writing books and journal articles as well as presentations which have made Americans and others more aware of global issues in librarianship. He has served ALA, ACRL and the International Federation of Library Associations admirably by chairing and serving on many committees dealing with international issues. The committee particularly admired Sharma's work with the United Negro College Fund and USAID to establish a partnership with the National University of Benin in West Africa. "He has produced an outstanding body of research and has also applied his research in meaningful, multicultural programs such as that in Benin. Dr. Sharma has devoted his life to his work and his research and richly deserves this recognition," said Warro.

Dr. Sharma earned his Bachelor's degree with honors as well as Masters in Arts (History) from the University of Delhi, India. He received his M.L.S. from North Texas State University, and was conferred Ph.D. in Information and Library Studies and Higher Education from the State University of New York at Buffalo. Since 1982, he has presented 25 papers at various conferences and has served on more than 30 committees of ACRL and ALA. During the year 2003-2004, Dr. Sharma chaired the Asian, African and Middle Eastern Section (AAMES) of ACRL, and was president of the Asian/Pacific American Librarians Association (APALA) (1993-94). Dr. Sharma was also involved in the ACRL International Relations Committee (1998-2002) and served as chair of the Near East and South Asia Committee, a sub-committee of the International Relations Committee (1996-98). He was a member of the ACRL Research Committee (1989-93), and the Racial and Ethnic Diversity Committee (1997-98). He is currently serving a term on the ACRL Standards & Accreditation Committee (2001-05).

At the ALA Annual Conference in Orlando in 2004, Dr. Sharma was instrumental in arranging Kay Raseroka, President of the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) to address the ACRL Asian, African and Middle Eastern Section (AAMES) program. This marked the first time that a standing IFLA president spoke at an ALA conference. In 1992, Sharma played a key role in inviting and arranging funding for six academic librarians from Australia, Brazil, England, India, Kenya and

Russia to speak on "Research and Academic Librarians" at the 6th ACRL National Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah. That same year, he chaired the American/South Asian Librarians Conference Committee for the Pre-IFLA Conference in New Delhi, India, which was attended by librarians and library educators from seven South Asian countries and a large delegation from the United States. Perseverance, courage and commitment are the chief attributes of this dynamic personality. Among his professional colleagues, Dr. Sharma is very popular for his hard working quality, dedication, instant decision making, imaginative planning, leadership, absolute integrity, oratory and terrific sense of humor. He has been a source of constant encouragement and inspiration to many librarians. Members of AAMES congratulate Dr. Sharma on this achievement and hope that he will continue to guide us.

To everybody else, it was probably another pleasant January Saturday afternoon in Ft. Lauderdale. But to the couple hundred fans of Bollywood movies, January 22nd was no ordinary Saturday. Fans of Hindi movies and Indian culture were in for a surprise treat as they walked into the gorgeous Alvin Sherman Library at the Nova Southeastern University in Ft. Lauderdale. The new 325,000 sq. ft. joint-use facility is Florida's largest library building and issues public library cards to the residents of Broward County. In the huge atrium of this academic/public library, people wandered around to see the exhibition of Indian arts and handicrafts, and to savor the mouthwatering Indian snacks including Tandoori chicken and Mango drinks. The event, called "Bollywood Comes to Broward," was organized to unveil the Hindi DVD and CD collection at the Alvin Sherman Library. Bollywood or Hindi movies are popular in the rest of the Indian subcontinent, the Middle East, parts of Africa, parts of Southeast

Asia, and among the South Asian diaspora worldwide. It has made waves in Europe and America as well.

Mou Chakraborty, Distance and Instructional Services Librarian, and LeThesha Harris, Audiovisual and Adult Services Librarian, organized and co-hosted the event. The audience, composed of South Asians, the Caribbeans, African Americans and Caucasians interested in the Indian culture, made this fun-filled event a grand success. The event ended with a colorful fashion show with participants from the Indian Students Association, the local Indian community, small children, and even librarians some of whom brought Canadian and African American flavor to this multicutural event. There was also a display of Indian as well as India related books. Although there were long lines at the Henna (mehendi) stations, there were hardly any people at the movie (Hum Tum starring Saif Ali Khan and Rani Mukherjee). The idea for the exhibit started more than a year ago, when we started buying the DVDs and CDs. The collection now consists of couple hundred DVDs and CDs-from oldies to current blockbuster hits, for example the Oscar-nominated Lagaan, Devdas, Kabhi Khushi Kabhi Gam, Kal Ho Na Ho, Indo-US, Indo-British movies, and the list goes on! The collection will expand as we continue adding to it. The CDs range from popular Hindi songs to classical music, ghazals, bhajans, and meditation music. Some folks in the audience were thrilled to learn that the collection also includes a cricket series! Some popular TV shows, like Ramayana, Mahabharata, Sri Krishna, Chanakya etc. are also part of the collection.

Poetess Ho Xuan Huong: The Brilliant Bad Girl of Eighteenth Century Vietnam at the Library of Congress. (Contributed by Binh P. Le, Associate Librarian, Penn State University)

Last year in December, under the sponsorship of the Library of Congress' John W. Kluge Center, the LC Asian Division, and the LC Asian American Association, John Balaban, accompanied by Ngo Thanh Nhan, a computational linguist at New York University and Lien Huong Fiedler, a Vietnam specialist at the Library of Congress, discussed the recently translated work, Spring Essence: The Poetry of Ho Xuan Huong.

To some, this seemed like an "ordinary event" at the Library of Congress. However, for many Vietnamese, it was indeed a noteworthy literary event, for a couple of reasons. To begin with, Ho Xuan Huong (1775-1820) was no ordinary poet. In fact, Ho Xuan Huong, as *Utme Reader* has fittingly noted, "was, simply, one of the most remarkable poets ever lived." Furthermore, what distinguishes Ho Xuan Huong from many other Vietnamese poets is that she was perhaps not only one the first Vietnamese but also

one of the world's pioneering literary feminists. Through her work, she daringly ridiculed Vietnam's most revered but archaic political, religious, and social institutions, including the Buddhist church. Above all, practically all of her poems, written in classic literary style, were loaded with sexual insinuations. In this regard, Ho Xuan Huong, in the words of Francis Fitzgerald, is the "brilliant bad girl of eighteenth century Vietnam, throwing her erotically-charged darts into the sexual hypocrisy of all ages and cultures."

It is also noteworthy that *Spring Es*sence: The Poetry of Ho Xuan Huong is printed in three scripts: English, quoc-ngu (modern Vietnamese), and the original "Nom." "Nom" is the ancient "ideographic vernacular script" of the Vietnamese language which was used in Vietnam from the 10th to the early 20th century. In fact, much of Vietnam's written history (literature, philosophy, history, law, medicine, religion, etc.) was printed or hand-written in "Nom." Unfortunately, today only a tiny number of Vietnamese can read "Nom." This work is the first reproduction of a book written in "Nom" by computer using Unicode. Now, the "Nom" texts can be digitized and translated into quoc ngu as well other foreign languages. It is hoped that it will not be long when the texts of nearly 1,000 years of Vietnamese civilization will be accessible!

• Compilation of an 'International Bibliography of Sikh Studies' (Dr. Rajwant Chilana, Associate Professor of Library Administration and South Asian Librarian, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign)

Sikhism is one of the youngest religions of South Asia, and its followers, Sikhs, are renowned as fierce and proud warriors. Because of their dedication, hard-work and entrepreneurship, a number of Sikh have occupied coveted positions like President, Prime Minister, Home Minister, Speaker of the Lok Sabha, Chief Ministers, Governors, Mayors, Chief of the Army, High Commissioners, Members of Parliament and Legislative Assemblies not only in India but also in other countries.

Due to their growing popularity, people from around the world want to learn more about their culture, history, politics, and religion. The growing awareness has resulted in an avalanche of literature on Sikh studies. For the bibliographical control of the voluminous literature on Sikhism, some efforts have been made in the past, but most of these works contained materials published up to 1980s and did not have international coverage. The present work is a first attempt of its kind to bring together at one place all books, composite works, journal articles, conference proceedings, theses, dissertations, project reports, and electronic resources produced globally until June 2004.

It is a monumental work of its kind ever ventured by a professional on such a vast scale that is being published by the Springer. This bibliography includes over 11,000 items of literature produced in English, and have been alphabetically listed by authors under twenty-eight chapters and sub-headings. In the first chapter on 'Printed & Electronic Resources', an annotated survey has been presented of all major reference documents published on Sikhism and a select listing of electronic and web based resources has been added. For the convenience of its easy use and retrieving information promptly, author and subject indexes have been appended to this work. This resource will also be accessible online as a searchable database (http://www.springeronline.com)
